#### **Today We Remember Agnes Young**

My mother was Agnes Young. After my mom and dad divorced, my mother moved to Frankfort, where she took a position working for the Kentucky Department of Education. While in Frankfort, she associated with the Baptist Church there. Also, during this time, she met and married Bill Young.

Bill was retired and he convinced her that she should retire also. So she did and they eventually moved back to Corbin. After they settled in here, she spoke of how much she had enjoyed her church in Frankfort and wanted to find such a place her in town. Her very first visit on that search was to First Baptist, and when I saw her later that afternoon I asked her what she thought about it. She said it was okay, and that she knew some of the people there and that they had been very friendly, but she still wanted to look around some. It was the following Thursday when Brother Dunaway made a visit to her and Bill. Apparently, the visit was successful, because she changed her mind that day and said she was going to First Baptist.

She became very involved in her new church. She taught Sunday School, helped with VBS and was on the Baptist Housing Board. She was happy to serve whereve she was asked. After she made a mission trip to Hawaii, I remember it took her 7 weeks to recuperate, but she sure did have a good time! She taught the young adult women in Sunday school, and some of those women were her age as well. There she formed lifelong friendships.

When Alex asked me to be a part of this Saints Recognition program, I told him I don't think so..I'm NOT a public speaker, and besides, I didn't think my mother was a saint. My friend, Ruth Bradley, informed that all believers in Christ are saints. If that's what it takes, then yes, Mommy was a saint.

One more thing I wanted to say about my mother:

She taught in a one-room school, a two-room school, a four-room school, on the high school level, in college, was a guidance counselor, and Director of the State of Kentucky School social workers. When she was nearing the end of her life, I asked her which one of those teaching gigs she had enjoyed the most. She said, "I liked them all. They were all differnt. But the one-room school with 8 grades was really a special place. Those children soaked up learning like sponges, they were always eager to learn. Different parents kept our water buckets filled, others kept the fire going before school started, and every Friday afternoon we played ball to end the school week. However, if I had my life to live over, I would begin it with the teaching of my adult peers, where I studied and worked harder to learn to teach." She said, "If I had started there first, I would have been a better teacher, and a much, much better human being." This was my mother. She loved to learn. She loved to teach.
